Promote attitudes and provide events that keep young people from driving when under the influence of alcohol and other drugs	Promote the benefits and safe use of seat belts, child safety seats, booster seats and air bags	Promote safe driving habits especially for less-experienced drivers.	Promote the empowerment of teens to speak up for their safety.	Promote conversation and training for parents of teens as they work together to enhance traffic safety.
<input type="checkbox"/> Conduct an activity to prompt young people to think about personal roles and dreams that might be unfulfilled if they were injured or killed in a traffic crash.	<input type="checkbox"/> Give a presentation to educate students by use of posters, morning announcements, Seat Belt Survey, etc.	<input type="checkbox"/> Hold a BIKE Safety event and start teaching younger people about safe driving habits	<input type="checkbox"/> Empower and educate youth to speak up for their safety. This could be done through skits created and presented to the student body, or community function	<input type="checkbox"/> Provide families with information such as: 99% of parents believe demonstrating good driving behavior is helpful in teaching their teen safe driving. Yet, 71% have talked on a cell phone while driving; 62% operated a radio, MP3 player, game or other device while driving, 26 % have broken the law.
<input type="checkbox"/> Conduct an activity to illustrate the negative consequences of delayed reactions. Contact the State Patrol or County sheriff for assistance.	<input type="checkbox"/> Hold a seatbelt check at your school. As students arrive, give them <i>SMARTIES</i> with a thank you note when seatbelts are latched. When seatbelt is not latched, give them a <i>DUM DUM</i> with a warning note.	<input type="checkbox"/> Provide an activity to make students aware of how easily they could be distracted by things both inside and outside the vehicle.	<input type="checkbox"/> Ask Chapter teams or individual members to complete a project to educate others.	<input type="checkbox"/> Use PSA's, news articles, social media, or create a half time presentation at a sporting event to get the word out to citizens in the community.
<input type="checkbox"/> Borrow specialized goggles and complete a project to show students how impairment can affect reaction time, etc.	<input type="checkbox"/> Host an event to inform new parents and grandparents about purchasing and properly installing car seats for infants.	<input type="checkbox"/> Host a speaker such as a local law enforcement officer, at a chapter meeting, school assembly, or community activity.	<input type="checkbox"/> Give a presentation to elementary students.	<input type="checkbox"/> Use the planning process and create your own message to others in your community.
