# **Putting the Fun in FUNdraiser!**

Picture this- it's lunch time, the bell has just rung, and students are charging out of classrooms toward....the FCS room? That's right, FCCLA is putting the FUN in Fundraising, and everyone at school wants to be a part of it.

The start of the school year is here, and with it an opportunity for FCCLA chapters to start planning out the year's work. It is also the perfect time to start learning about the different types of fundraising opportunities available to chapters. Today, we'll go through some different fundraising ideas for you and your chapter.

Starting off our list of fundraising ideas are a group of fundraisers very near and dear to my heart- food related fundraisers. The most well-known of these is the bake sale, because everyone loves food, even more so if the food is delicious sugary desserts. To stage a bake sale, enlist the help of chapter members or a cooking class, and sell treats during breaks in classes. Bake sales are a good way to raise money because not only are they relatively inexpensive, but they can be put on whenever, with any amount of participation from chapter members. Another great food related fundraiser is cake or cupcake decorating. Have your chapter make unfrosted cakes or cupcakes, then let people decorate them for a small sum. There are many more of these food fundraisers, but these two are both fun and easy to do either in FCS class, or during an FCCLA meeting.

For the more competitively-inclined chapters, competitions that double as fundraisers are ideal. Given proper promotion, these serve as a fun way to involve members and non-members alike. The first competition, pumpkin painting, is very seasonal, and would be best held during the months of October and November. Participants would either pay to enter a pumpkin in the contest, or pay to cast votes for their favorite squash. The second competitive fundraiser is a little more timeless. Best submitted via videos, a karaoke/lip sync contest is a great way to showcase creativity and break people out of their comfort zone. Again, participants would either pay to enter a video, or pay to cast their vote for the best singer. The possibilities for competition fundraisers are only limited by the size of your imagination.

The final category of fundraiser that we'll cover today is something a bit different. I like to call it "Teacher Cooperation Required." The first of these is the classic Pie Throw. To do this fundraiser, all you need is a pie tin, whipped cream, and a teacher with a sense of humor. Also, a janitor. First, get a teacher who is willing to have a pie thrown at them agree to help your chapter. Then, have students donate until you reach your goal. Finally, gather an audience and throw the pie! The second "Teacher Cooperation Required" fundraiser is the Principal Challenge. This works much the same way as the Pie Throw: Enlist the principal's help, raise money until your goal is met, and then put your challenge in action. The twist on the Principal Challenge is that you can ask your principal to do anything if your donation goal is met- dye their hair a crazy color, publicly breakdance, or allow everyone to leave school twenty minutes early. Of course, these all depend on gaining teacher approval, and may be more difficult to put together than other fundraisers.

Hopefully you gained some ideas about different types of fundraisers that you and your chapter can put together this school year. By putting the FUN in Fundraising, you can raise money for cool initiatives and new goals!
